



ETHICS UDHR LAWS CARDS

INSTRUCTIONS

- Divide the cards up among your group.
- Designate three areas of the table:
 1. IN EVERY CASE
 2. IN MOST CASES
 3. IN SOME CASES
- Without talking, read your cards and place them face up in the area you think they belong.
- When you are done, look at the rest of the cards on the table. If you disagree on the placement of any other card, turn it face down.
- Finally, look at all the cards that are face down and try to reach a consensus on where each card should go.

Part 2:

- The cards in the IN EVERY CASE are universal rights that you all agree should be granted to everyone regardless of age, gender, religion, etc.
- For any cards not in the IN EVERY CASE category, can you amend the language or idea in some way until you are able to reach a consensus about placing it there?

Killing is wrong.

It is wrong to keep someone else as a slave.

After a certain age, people should be able to marry whomever they choose.

People should be allowed to say or write what they wish.

All people should be treated equally. Treatment should not depend on such things as their gender, appearance, or the country they are from.

People in prison should be told why they are being held.

People should be allowed to criticize the government.

People should be allowed to talk to and meet anyone they wish.

It is wrong to force a person to work.

A person accused of a crime should be tried by someone who has nothing to do with the case.

People should be allowed to travel and leave their country if they wish.

Private letters and telephone calls should not be intercepted.

People should be allowed to have, or not have, whatever religious beliefs they wish.

All people have a right to belong to a country.

All people have the right to medical help if they are ill.

All people have a right to education. Parents have the right to choose the kind of education to be given to their children.
